## Equal access for patients

**Goal 1:** To promote **equal access to best quality information and healthcare** for EU patients, their informal caregivers, and families.

- Patient Empowerment: with Respect EPF identified needs of children and their families & produced a model for empowerment in clinical trials
- Quality of Care: InterQuality projects to analyse current financing mechanisms of the healthcare system
- Patients' right in cross border healthcare: long and intensive involvement.
   Outcome: National contact points and cooperation in key areas (eHealth, HTA, rare diseases)
- Information to patients/ Health literacy: various member consultation +
   Health literacy conference. A growing priority for the European Commission



#### Involvement of Patients

**Goal 2:** To ensure **meaningful patient involvement** in EU health-related policy-making, programmes and projects

- Value + :
- Developing of a Model of Patient Involvement + a set of key resources
- Model adopted in FP7 calls, used in RESPECT
- Collaboration with DG Research + National contact point to promote patient involvement
- Transferrable model: HTA, Structural funds
- Pharmacovigilance: involvement and empowerment of patients- e.g. Direct patient reporting, opening of Eudravigilance
- Patient safety and Quality of Care: At EU level recognition that patients need to be involved and empowered=an essential element for safety and quality of care





#### Patient Perspective

**Goal 3:** To ensure a patients' perspective, including issues around human rights and quality of life, is heard in developments at the EU level on health economics and health efficacy (health, wealth and equity)

 EPF has been involved in many projects aimed at gathering patient evidence and involving patients as experts in:

- HTA: 2010 Seminar and 3-stage survey, EUnetHTA
- eHealth: e.g Renewing health, Chain of Trust
- To achieve patient perspective in all health related policies
  - + Gain support from EU institution:
- EPF campaign for the manifesto 150 millions reasons to act
- EPF is a speaker moderator or chair in more than 50 meeting/year
- Work in specific themes e.g. Medical devices





#### Sustainable patient organisations & patient unity

**Goal 4:** To encourage inclusive, effective and sustainable representative patient organisations.

**Goal 5**: To nurture and promote solidarity and unity across the EU patients' movement. No patient organisation is too small to contribute to our work.

- Implementation of four Regional Advocacy Seminars
- Youth Strategy: launched in 2011 with the establishment of the EPF Youth Group. Step forward: EPF giving a voice to young patients and fostering their active participation in patient organisations.
- Rights and need of older patients:
- -Commitment to the European Innovative
- -Partnership on Active and Healthy Ageing EPF Warsaw Conference 2011





#### Key achievements -the overall picture

- EPF joined important EU consortia delivering on EU flagship initiatives in the field of health and health ICT (RENEWING HEALTH, SUSTAINS as well as the eHealth Governance Initiative.
- As from 2007, EPF has been involved as leader in three EU projects (Value+, Chain of TRUST, and EUPATI)-Proactive approach
- associated partner in other 9 European projects ( including RESPECT, EUnetPAS, Calliope Thematic Network,, EUnetHTA, INTERQUALITY, Joint Action on Patient Safety and Quality of Care...)
- In Policy and project alike, we cooperate with an increasing number of partners: e.g. EUPATI

## EPF also face big challenges

- Economic environment: difficulties to obtain funding, and in certain sensitive areas: e.g.
   Health inequalities
- Increased demand on EPF: In terms of quantity, quality, and technicity: prioritisation
- Engaging with an ever-growing and diverse membership: Optimising communication e.g. finding the right contacts, areas of interest knowledge base



- Capacity building follow-up: Adoption of a mainstreamed capacity building programme
- Engaging with the Council: a 'sticking point' for policy advocacy



### But EPF has also acquired important 'capital'

 Growing infrastructure: EPF has grown to become a solid and sustainable organisation in terms of both representation and impact

The secretariat is also growing: More staff
 And new areas of competence

 Dynamic and active Board key to the functioning and representation of EPF

 Growing, inclusive, active Membership: from 23 (2006) to 54 (2012) – 12 countries and growing – representativeness. Growing expertise on specific areas.
