Cohesion Policy: a quick overview

Cohesion Policy and Structural Fund

- Cohesion Policy is the EU's strategy to promote and support the "overall harmonious development" of its Member States and regions
- The Structural Funds together with the Cohesion Fund are the Cohesion Policy's key financial instruments. They provide the financial resources to promote economic, social and territorial cohesion across European regions.

2 Structural Funds

- European Regional Development Fund (ERDF)
 - "hard investment"
- European Social Fund (ESF)
 - "soft investment"

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3 Objectives

- Convergence (poorest regions)
- Competitiveness and Employment (more developed regions)
- Territorial co-operation (all regions)




- Current programming period 2007-2013

Because economic disparities among 27 EU Member States are great....




..but even more among their regions...




Who benefits the most from Cohesion Policy?

National/regional decision-making



Lach Wember State prepares:

A National Strategic Reference Framework (NSRF) 27 in place 2007-2013

Document defining the strategy chosen by the Member State and proposes a list of operational programmes that it hopes to implement

Operational Progarmmes (OPs) approx. 450 in place for 2007-2013

The NSRF is implemented through a certain number of regional and horizontal Operational Programmes (OPs), each one including a certain number priorities, which in turn are broken down in measures and axes

Responsibility for the implementation of Structural Funds lies with the Member States and their regions

Can stakeholders get involved?

Partnership Principle

Article 11 General Structural Funds Regulation:

Member States are required to involve all relevant partners, **including NGOs**, throughout all stages of Structural Funds from design to final evaluation

Implementation of partnership responsibility of the Member States

- > Open on line written Consultations
- National/regional round tables
- > Ad-hoc expert committees

Current Programming period 2007-2013

- Health has been listed as a priority for Structural Funds for the first time in 2007
 - many countries are using Stuctural Funds to support health projects and investment
- Structural Funds invest in other areas relevant to patient organisations such as:
 - > Social Inclusion,
 - > Anti-discrimination
 - > Access to employment
 - Education and training
 - > Urban projects and local services
 - > .

...looking at 2014-2020...

Why should patient organisations get involved?

- To ensure that health remains a priority for Cohesion Policy 2014-20
- To promote health mainstreaming in Structural Funds
- To ensure that patients perspective is fully integrated in Cohesion Policy from design to final evaluation
- To ensure that patients are recognised as a special target group
- To ensure access to funds to small NGOs
- To ensure a patient voice in relevant monitoring committee

Some general challenges

- Competition in Cohesion Policy is extremely high
 - > Sectorial level: competition between different eligible policy areas
 - > **Geographical level**: competition between different countries and regions (richer vs. poorer countries/regions, urban areas vs. rural areas, peripheral vs. central regions etc.)
 - Sovernance level: competition between national and regional authorities and between regional and local authorities
 - > Stakeholder level: competition between stakeholders within the same policy area
- Need to cooperate with other stakeholders within and beyond heallth sector (e.g. other civil society organisations)
- Technical competences are needed to participate

Can participating in decision-making make a difference?

Bad news

Influencing the Structural Funds requires NGOs to invest time and energy in preparing for a consultation, establish contacts with other stakeholders and building working relationships with the officials concerned.

Good news

Although influencing policy-making is hard exercise there exist many examples from all across Europe of NGO groups which have successfully managed to influence Structural Funds design.

Accessing Structural funding

Funding opportunities

There might exist different opportunities for your organisation. It is important therefore important to first consider whether you are best placed to:

- Implement a project
 - Manage a project
 - Participating in a project as partner
- Tender to deliver services under an existing project
- Benefit directly from a project set up to support the third sector (capacity-building)
- Benefit from technical assistance and global grants opportunities

DIRECTLY-MANAGED EU FUNDING PROGRAMMES

PHP, FP7, CIP etc..

- Multi-year EU-level funding programme (2007-2013)
- Management level: centralised
- Priorities: set at EU level
- Focus: all EU countries+other depending on programme
- Annual EU-level call for proposals
- Competition for funding at EU level
- Multi-country partnership (from at least 3 different EU countries)
- Project results to be applyied in more than one EU country

INDIRECTLY-MANAGED EU FUNDING PROGRAMMES

STRUCTURAL FUNDS

- Multi-year national or regional level funding programmes (2007-2013)
- Management level: decentralised
- Priorities: set at national/reg level
- Focus: MS and regions with GDP procapita<75% EU average
- Calls decided by national authorities
- Competition for funding at nat. level
- Partnership, when required, includes only local organisations
- Project results apply locally

Member States and regions

The **EU does not manage the Structural Funds programmes** and that the national and/or regional authorities are the only ones to grant projects at national/regional level.

It is thus not possible to apply for any Structural Funds project at the EU level

Funding opportunities for patient organisations

• The European Social Fund:

Patient organisations could apply for various types of projects under different ESF priorities both as individual beneficiaries and as part of consortia. Such projects could be related to:

- Health information campaigns
- Screening programmes
- Health literacy programmes
- Antidiscrimination measures promotion for people with disability and/or chronic condition (when applicable)
- Training for informal carers
- Access to employment and vocational training for patients
- Improving access to services for disadvantaged groups and minorities
- Capacity-building
