Background information

On 7 April 2014, at the second meeting of the HTA Network, Paola Testori Coggi, Director General DG SANCO, presented the European Commission strategic vision for a sustainable European cooperation in health technology assessment, inviting Member States to propose a long-term approach, stressing "the importance of turning the European cooperation between HTA Agencies from a project-based initiative into a permanent mechanism of cooperation".

Since then, the Commission consulted Member States and all stakeholders on possible future scenarios, and as a result, a proposal for a Regulation on HTA Cooperation was proposed to the European Parliament (largely adopted in October 2018).

As we are approaching a new phase in the **COVID-19 crisis**, twenty-one months since the adoption by the European Parliament, and after the Council and its working group met on several occasions, the European Union is considering a more ambitious health policy than previously foreseen for the upcoming MFF, through the EU4Health programme and other initiatives. In this context, the Proposal for a Regulation on **European Cooperation in Health Technology Assessment** is very timely: European patients and citizens count on and national policy makers to make significant progress towards discussions with the Commission and the Parliament, for a rapid adoption.

However, discussions on the proposal seem to face technical barriers.

Patients understand the concerns expressed by some Member States, but also considers that such barriers can now be overcome.

European citizens realise their health relies on a **transparent**, **high quality and effective EU cooperation**. In that sense, we consider that an agreement on the HTA regulation is not just only urgent, but also possible.

On **9 September**, **15:00-17:00**, the European Patients' Forum (EPF), EURORDIS and MEP Tiemo Wölken are co-hosting an online event to relaunch a constructive debate and boost HTA cooperation at European level to effectively respond to the needs of national health systems and patients across Europe, in the context of COVID-19 response and beyond. Participation will be open to the public upon registration by **September 8**th.
