

- Framed around "challenges" slower economic recovery, instability and insecurity.. Brexit, Grexit
- Almost no direct mention of health
  - Health and safety of workers
  - Anti-microbial resistance
  - HTA
- NOTHING on Patients Invisible Citizens

# Setting the scene



• Ever-growing need for patient input: advocacy, projects, regulatory (EMA), HTA etc.:

Capacity

Impact?

Prioritisation

- Need to meet this growing demand: funding, especially long-term, remains a challenge for our sustainability
- Core grants: European Commissions' grant added-value, challenges, sustainability, rules governing them.
- Working group emerging from EMA-PCWP to develop a long-term strategy on patient/public health organisations' role and sustainability: role, mandate, expectations...

# Setting the scene



 Role of POs in delivering EU programmes / contributing to key projects:

Increased need for patient involvement

Increased competition!

How to guarantee patient perspective is represented in winning bid?

- IMI funding: our experience so far current challenges; how to ensure that more patient groups are represented in key projects?
- **PPP in medicine development**, potentially in other areas, and role of patient groups
- Cooperation with industry: corporate sponsorship, challenges, sustainability, transparency and accountability / public perception
