

Patient Advocacy in Neurological Services in Ireland

Historical Deficits

The Irish neurological sector has a poor historical record in advocating for improved services and supports.

Following massive health spending increases in the Celtic Tiger era, Ireland still had:

- Lowest per capita number of neurologists and rehabilitation medicine consultants in Europe.
- 1 in 6 patients getting specialist neurorehabilitation.
- Massive deficits in acute care for many conditions.
- 37% waiting over 6 months for neurosurgery; 38% neurology outpatients waiting over 1 year for appointment.

End of the Boom

How can we achieve better services amidst Ireland's economic collapse?

By using credible evidence to build support for initiatives we can prove will save lives, reduce disability and improve quality of life and will also save money or at least be cost neutral.



Signs of progress

Great strides being made on specific conditions such as stroke, epilepsy and Alzheimer's.

Three years ago Irish stroke services worst in western Europe with 25% of deaths blamed on inadequate services.

A massive expansion of acute services and dedicated stroke physician, specialist nurse and therapist post have significantly reduced stroke deaths and disability and are reducing overall service costs.

This achieved by building evidence base; strong lobbying and comms platform and stroke survivor involvement.

RELAND GETS A CARD FOR NEUROLOGICAL CARE

In May 2013, Ireland will host European Month of the Brain as part of our EU presidency. However, services for over 700,000 people in this country living with neurological conditions are among the worst in Europe.

RED CARD Many people have to wait over a year for a neurology appointment in Ireland. In the UK, the maximum waiting time is 19 weeks.

RED CARD Ireland has the fewest rehabilitation consultants per capita in Europe. Sixteen months ago the Government published a national neurorehabilitation strategy but there is still no implementation plan.

RED CARD Continuous cutbacks mean that vital neurological services are being curtailed or cut down completely.

The **Neurological Alliance of Ireland (NAI)** is the national umbrella for over 30 neurological groups. We urge Oireachtas members to support people with neurological conditions during Brain Month by:

- Calling for an implementation plan for the national neurorehabilitation strategy.
- Highlighting issues affecting your constituents with neurological conditions and calling for improved services.
