EPF is very pleased to share with you some exciting news in this issue. Our EU project proposal submitted under the European Public Health Programme "VALUE +" has been approved! Readers will recall that "VALUE +" addresses both at policy and programme level strategies to involve patients organisations meaningfully in EU health related projects (see section 18). This goes to the heart of EPF's work on promoting patient-centred equitable health-care throughout the European Union and we are very much looking forward to launching "VALUE +" with partners in early 2008. We were also delighted to learn that "EURONETPAS" project, led by France and focusing on setting up a European Patient Safety Network has also been approved. Alongside the Member States and several other health stakeholders, EPF is an associate partner in this project. EURONETPAS marks an important step in ensuring that "patient safety" remains high on the EU agenda.

The EPF secretariat welcomes our new stagiaire this month, Elisabeth Kasilingam from France. Elisabeth has a legal background and is especially interested in patients/ human rights. We are looking forward to working together with her over the next 9 months. EPF has also launched an equal opportunities recruitment procedure to employ a programme officer from early 2008. (see section 19)

EPF representatives contributed to several major EU health meetings. Brief reports on these meetings feature in this issue – including our work at the European Health Forum Gastein and the European Conference on Patient Safety Research in Porto.

Our Autumn Advocacy Seminar here in Brussels is fast approaching and we look forward to seeing many of our patient representatives there from throughout the EU. 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The next issue of the Internal Mailing will take place towards the beginning of December. The deadline for contributions is 5 December 2007.

1. Pharmaceutical Forum developments

EPF was represented at recent meetings of the Pharmaceutical Forum where the focus was taking forward a work plan in each of the three core areas (Information to Patients, Relative Effectiveness, and Pricing and Reimbursement) based on the Conclusions of the High Level Pharmaceutical Forum back in June 2007. Readers will recall that this is the final year of the Pharmaceutical Forum with the final High Level Ministerial Meeting scheduled to take place in September 2008.

There have been particularly interesting developments in the area of Information to Patients, where EPF was represented by Susanna Palkonen, EPF Vice President at its latest meeting on 15 October. Three work streams were agreed: developing a strategy in relation to information to patients in specific healthcare settings (community pharmacists, hospitals, and primary health care settings); exploring methodology around the application of quality principles on information to patients; and partnership in developing ITP pilots at national level. Given the fundamental importance of all these areas, EPF has committed to be as active as possible in contributing to each from a patients' perspective. Other good news is that the Joint Statement on Information to Patients, coordinated by the European Public Health Alliance (EPHA) and signed by 21 health organisations including EPF has been well received by the Commission. The Statement makes the case for indepth analysis and research based on existing materials and sources, exploration of good practice examples of public private partnerships in relation to ITP, strategies to optimise the impact of EMEA networks and Eudrapharm, promoting health literacy and using the structural funds to the maximum extent possible. The signatory organisations will meet again in the near future to examine how to advance on these actions in concrete terms and EPF is very pleased to contribute to this work.

The information to patients' working group also learned that a legislative proposal will be made by the end of 2008 in relation to article 88A of Directive 2001/83/EC, which called on the Commission to submit a report in 2007 and "if appropriate, put forward proposals setting out an information strategy to ensure good quality, reliable and non promotional information on medicinal products and other treatments and shall address the question of the information source's liability".

This proposal will be developed on the basis of an impact assessment from an economic, environmental, public health and social perspective. Key stakeholders will be consulted on these developments through interviews in November and December. EPF will report further on this in the next Mailing.

With regard to developments in relation to Pricing and Reimbursement, the working group met at the beginning of October and agreed to fine-tune the guiding principles on pricing and reimbursement, following pilot work with volunteer Member States and companies, and evaluation of their impact on cost-containment, access to patients and reward for innovation. Further debates will take place on the value of innovation, with a survey across the European Union on good practice; and continued exchanges of information around pricing. EPF will continue to input on all of these areas from the perspective of patients. It was also agreed that the Pricing and Reimbursement working group would explore in further depth trade and distribution, including the themes of parallel trade and trade and distribution margins.

The Relative Effectiveness working group has agreed to pursue work in relation to the development of principles to establish good practice for relative effectiveness assessments and a tool box; to explore the availability of data by using real life examples, and the development of networking and collaboration. EPF has joined a sub-group on networking and our contribution will be in relation to the added value of involving stakeholder groups, including patients, in post Pharmaceutical Forum developments.

2. EU Patient Safety Network Project approved

We are pleased to let you know that project EUNetPaS (European Union Network for Patient Safety) has been officially recommended for funding by the Public Health Executive Agency.

The project aims to establish an umbrella European network to improve cooperation between EU Member States in the field of patient safety (culture, reporting and learning systems, education) and avoid effort duplication in developing patient safety programmes at Member State level.

The project is led by Haute Autorité de Santé in France and involves partners from all Member States and a broad range of stakeholders. EPF is one of the partners.

3. Animal Testing

The <u>EPF Statement on animal testing</u> has now been approved, by the vast majority of EPF's organisations. EPF will be distributing this statement widely during forthcoming debates in the EU Institutions on the Animal Welfare Directive.

4. European Commission Future Challenges Paper: 2009 –2014

DG SANCO (Health and Consumer Protection Directorate General) has recently published a paper entitled Future Challenges: 2009-2014 based on several different workshops and future scenarios.

Nicola Bedlington was invited to present EPF's perspective on health equity to contribute towards this work. The four core challenges identified through this process are governance, globalisation, changing society and confidence. The paper will be widely distributed as the draft vision of the main challenges to be addressed under the lifespan of the next Commission. EPF alongside other stakeholders, has been invited to give feedback on this by the end of December.

5. European Commission consultation on the Future of Pharmaceuticals for Human Use

EPF submitted its <u>response to the Commission Consultation Paper on the Future of Pharmaceuticals for Human Use</u>. We also had the opportunity to present the key challenges on the future of pharmaceuticals, as identified by the EPF membership at a parallel session devoted to pharmaceuticals at the European Health Forum Gastein.

6. PES Manifesto for June 2009

EPF has received a letter from Poul Nyrup Rasmussen, President of the Party of European Socialists, requesting our input in a broad public consultation with civil society and other stakeholders this autumn as part of a process for elaborating a PES manifesto for the European elections of June 2009. The consultation will run until June 2008 and will focus on gathering the best political ideas and proposals on four main themes: Save our Planet (climate change, energy and sustainable development agenda); New Social Europe (particularly the social, economic and employment agenda); European Democracy and Diversity (on how to improve democracy and fundamental rights in the EU); and Europe in the World.

7. ALDE campaign for EU Patients' Rights

The Alliance of Liberals and Democrats for Europe (ALDE) supports EU citizens and their rights to health care; especially for a fast access to high quality and safe health care, regardless of state borders, and a free access to the achievements of European science for all EU citizens. The ALDE launched a campaign to make sure the Charter of Patients' Rights will be included in the future Community frame for health services.

8. EESC: own-initiative opinion on Patients' Rights approved

In the plenary session of the 26-27 of September 2007, the European Economic and Social Committee approved the own-initiative opinion on Patient's rights, by 108 votes to none, with two abstentions.

The opinion, presented by M. Bouis, underlines the need for changes in relations between all health professionals and healthcare structures and patients on a daily basis. The place of the patient has to be rethought in her/his interaction with the system, so that a solid relationship between professionals and patient can be built and the patient's empowerment can be ensured.

The EESC considers that three rights are preconditions for others rights: the right to information, the right to free and informed consent and the right to dignity. The EESC also welcomes the European Charter of Patients' Rights and calls on the European Commission to establish a European Patients' Rights Day, as proposed by the European Citizenship Network.

9. World Health Organization Global Strategy and Plan of action on Public health Innovation and Intellectual Property

EPF has given its support to the response prepared by the International Alliance of Patient Organizations (IAPO) on the WHO Global Strategy, that focused specifically on three key themes: innovation and access; patient safety; and neglected diseases and neglected patients. EPF will be participating in the event organised by IAPO around the next meeting of the Intergovernmental Working Group in early November in Geneva.

10. EMEA Brainstorming meeting on the provision of information to its stakeholders

The meeting was held in London on 20 September and gave an overview of EMEA current communication tools and information practices. EMEA website includes information on all "centrally authorized" medicines (medicines that have been granted a single "marketing authorization") for use in EU countries.

Participants raised several points for restructuring the website for better accessibility. It was highlighted that most of the current website visitors are regulators and industry representatives and that there was a need to provide easier access to information for health professionals and patients.

11. Third Annual Conference of the European Federation of Nursing Regulators - FEPI

This Conference "Placing the patient first - Effective Nursing Regulation in Europe" (25-28 September 2007, Dubrovnik) focused on three thematic areas: provision of quality nursing services in the internal market, recognition of professional qualifications and nursing education and competences.

Nicola Bedlington represented EPF at this meeting and gave a presentation on patient—centred health care in Europe. Useful discussions took place on the value of cooperation between FEPI and EPF, particularly with regard to concrete projects such as the "TUNING Project" on tuning educational structures in Europe. 12. Patient Safety Research Conference - Shaping the European Agenda

The conference (24-26 September, Porto) looked in depth at how research into patient safety incidents can provide a scientific basis for measures to improve healthcare safety and quality.

This was a crucial opportunity for EPF to express the solidarity of patients groups and to put forward the message that there should be no patient safety research without involving patients.

EPF was represented by Roxana Radulescu who made a presentation in the session "Research commissioning: Developing capacity and partnerships". She highlighted the need for a meaningful involvement of patients' organisations as a critical success factor for research on patient safety. Patients can not only help identifying the right research topics but also ensure this are better targeted and therefore more likely to be used. Patient associations and self help groups can play a critical role in participating in research, as well as in disseminating the results through their networks and facilitating the dialogue between researchers and policy-makers.

The Conference conclusions formed a ten-point Call for Action that was distributed across European health authorities for urgent implementation.

We are very pleased to see that one of the recommendations is to develop strategies to involve patients in patient safety research programmes and activities.

15. Are patients sufficiently informed nowadays? Rights and ethics

Roxana Radulescu gave a presentation on EU developments on information to patients and EPF's position on the Commission's report on information to patients on medicinal products at a conference in Ljubljana, on 10 October.

Organised by the Forum of International Research and Development Pharmaceutical Companies, the conference brought together representatives of chronic patients' associations, doctors, pharmacists, layers and representatives of government institutions and pharmaceutical companies. This was organised in the context of the Bill on Patients' Rights in Slovenia being currently under adoption in the Slovenian Parliament.

16. HAI Open Seminar – Ensuring Independent Medicines Information in Europe

This seminar was held in Brussels on 12 October. The keynote presentation "You say information, I say advertising..." by Barbara Mintzes and Teresa Alves explained the potential implications for public health of the widespread promotion of medicines to health professionals and increasingly to the public, with the example of the recent experience of the arthritis drug Vioxx. This launched a lively and interesting debate, with a wealth of information from various perspectives. Speakers included representatives of the European Consumers' Organisation (BEUC), Association Internationale de la Mutualité (AIM), healthcare professionals organisations, European Commission, pharmaceutical industry, drug regulators, MEPs, patient organisations and independent society drug bulletins.

17. Board Meeting Outcomes
