Consultation process on the new EU initiative on non-communicable diseases

In January, the European Commission continued work on its **new initiative on non-communicable diseases** (NDCs). Launched in December 2021, this initiative aims at helping the EU Member States to reduce the burden of NDCs in five areas: cardiovascular diseases, diabetes, chronic respiratory diseases, mental health and neurological disorders and health determinants. In each of these strands, the initiative will promote the reduction of health inequalities. Health-stakeholders' (including patient organisations) wishing to contribute to the initiatives' objectives could be eligible for support.

The initiative's development stage, currently taking place in collaboration with the EU Member States and other health stakeholders, will last **until 22 June 2022**.

Patient organisations and other health organisations wishing to contribute to the initiative's shaping can participate in stakeholders' discussions and provide input only via the Non-Communicable Diseases Thematic Network of the **EU Health Policy Platform**. For that purpose, the European Commission has already made available via the Platform a template for input collection.

In addition, the European Commission will organise a webinar on the topic **on 3 February, from 14h00 to 16h00**. You can already register **here**. Participation in this webinar is free of charge. The (provisional) dates for the next stakeholder webinars are 17 March, 27 April, and 3 June, with a launch event on 22 June.

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On 13 January 2022, EPF and ONCA hosted a webinar on patient involvement in nutritional care policy & practice. This webinar kicks off a series of activities to establish a structural collaboration between the patient advocate, nutritional care expert and policymaker.

About ONCA

Launched in 2014, the Optimal Nutritional Care for All (ONCA) campaign is a multistakeholder initiative to facilitate greater screening for risk of disease-related malnutrition/undernutrition and nutritional care implementation across Europe.

The campaign supports national professional societies, associations and patient groups in public health and health care to implement nutritional risk screening and optimal nutritional care in their country. The campaign is now implemented in 19 European countries.

State of play of Artificial Intelligence in Healthcare in EU member states

On 11 November 2021, the European Commission published its "Artificial Intelligence (AI) in Healthcare" report, accompanied by country factsheets on the situation in each EU member state. The reports provide an overview of the development, adoption and use of AI technologies and applications in the healthcare sector across all Member States. The reports aim to identify and address issues that could hamper the adoption of AI technologies in the healthcare sector and will help the Commission to advance the effective adoption and implementation of AI in healthcare.

The reports highlight that most EU member states have developed AI strategies that identify healthcare as a priority sector, but they have not designed specific policies, within these strategies, targeting healthcare. Likewise, healthcare organisations in the EU are open to adopting AI applications, but adoption remains limited. The main challenges identified by relevant stakeholders include the lack of confidence in AI-based decision support and issues relating to the integration of new technologies into current practices. However, the reports note that EU Member States have made progress in proposing regulatory frameworks around health data management, which is fundamental to the roll-out of AI technologies in the healthcare sector.

As the study and country factsheets point out, AI is already being used in the healthcare sector and has potential for further development. EPF has been engaging in extensive work, both through policy inputs and capacity building, to bring the patient perspective to the development and use of artificial intelligence in healthcare.

Launch of the Innovative Health Initiative

On 26 January 2022, the **Innovative Health Initiative** (IHI) held a **kick-off event** to mark the launch of the world's largest public-private research collaboration in the life sciences, supported by €2.4 billion in financing.

IHI Executive Director Pierre Meulien presented the initiative at the launch event, and highlighted its core goals – to translate its work into 'tangible benefits for patients and society,' and ensuring Europe remains at the cutting-edge of research. He also underlined the key ways in which the IHI would differ from the previous Innovative Medicines Initiative (IMI) programmes.

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project and now independent foundation, as a key success of the former IMI programme, and an example of the type of work IHI hopes to reinforce.

The IHI has published its **Strategic Research and Innovation Agenda**, highlighting its priority areas for the programme and thematic aim which will focus on the healthcare pathway: from early-stage research and prevention, to diagnostics, to disease management. The IHI will also publish a patient engagement strategy.

The IHI has launched a call for expression of interest for participants in a **Science and Innovation Panel**, which will include different stakeholder groups, including patients. The call is open until **21 February.**

The first call for proposals is estimated to go online by April 2022.

n austworary relationship with a clinician is key for improving treatment outcomes in individuals with schizophrenia, But, at present, we lack knowledge of the key ingredients and challenges of an effective therapeutic relationship. To address this gap, **GAMIAN-Europe** has teamed up with the EPA, to undertake an in -depth qualitative analysis of this topic.

Research is currently ongoing – with interviews being carried out in mental health centres in Germany, Poland, Italy, and Hungary.

Suicide Prevention in Young Men

Suicide is commonly described as a 'male phenomenon', as men are 4 to 5 times more likely to die by suicide compared to women, in the European Union. EU regulator backs Pfizer's antiviral pills to treat COVID-19

The European Medicines Agency recommended the use of Pfizer's antiviral therapy Paxlovid to treat people diagnosed with COVID-19.

The oral tablets should be given to people most at risk of developing severe disease from the infection. The therapy, a combination of two pills, is intended for people who do not require supplemental oxygen.

ECDC eyes transition to 'post-acute' phase of coronavirus pandemic

The EU's disease control agency has issued a mixed verdict on the state of the pandemic in its latest risk assessment: infections have hit new records but there are signs that the pandemic will transition to a more manageable phase following this latest wave. Cases in the EU/EEA are four times higher than the previous peak, with a 14-day notification rate of 2,621 cases per 100,000, the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control said. The more infectious Omicron variant is driving this increase as it spreads eastward across the continent.

Denmark becomes first EU country to scrap all COVID-19 restrictions

Denmark is to lift all remaining COVID-19 restrictions, with Omicron hospital admissions and deaths remaining stable and high rates of vaccination. "Tonight we can shrug our shoulders and find the smile again. We have incredibly good news, we can now remove the last coronavirus restrictions in Denmark," Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen said at a press conference, following recommendations from the Epidemic Commission and with all the main political parties' support. The last restrictions will be dropped on February 1.
