Re: European Patients' Forum response regarding the Open Consultation on Patient Safety in the European Union

Dear Mr McGill,

We would like to thank the European Commission for launching the public consultation on patient safety in the European Union. We welcome this opportunity to express our patients' constituency's views on such an important issue.

However, there are a number of key points we would like to highlight in relation to the consultation structure:

- As a pan-European patient organization representing 35 European diseasespecific patients' organizations and national coalitions of patients' organizations - we have responded rather to those questions that have a European policy dimension.
- We found that most of the questions were tailored to Member States authorities (ex. "How important is... in your country?"; "Which organization do you think should be responsible for...?") This went beyond our remit and we found regretable that little space was provided for patients organizations, be it European, national or regional, to address the specificity of their own constituency.
- We found also difficult ranking on a scale issues that, from our perspective, are ALL important in a systemic approach to improve patients' safety (for example the types of adverse events (Question 11) or the essential components of a patient safety strategy (Question 12).

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Finally, we make a plea for a meaningful involvement of patients' organizations in further consultations processes that should provide an easier to answer and a more flexible format.

We would like to thank you again for this opportunity to input and remain at your disposal for any further information that you may require.
