

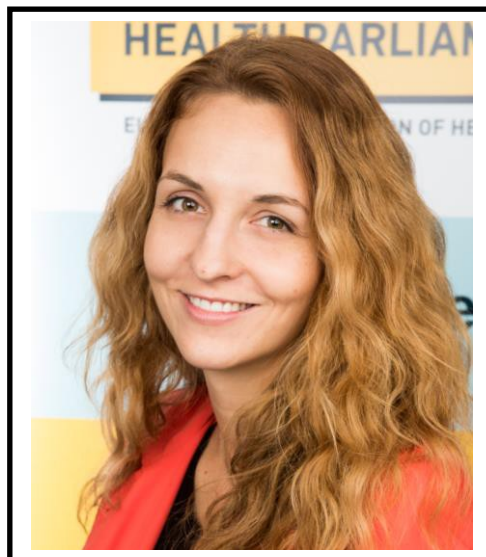

With great luck after 6 days on the acute waiting list I had a successful liver transplant. Right after I got involved in peer-to-peer and sport programs, helping my rehabilitation both mentally and physically. Suddenly I found myself on the other side, volunteering for the patient organisations which have helped me when I needed the most. I also started playing sports, tennis and volley ball and competing on the transplant level at international championships for transplanted people. Concerning my everyday, I am a health economist and working as a full-time researcher at an independent research institute in Budapest.
